
Nurse Supervisors and Nurse Managers: This is a great chance to build your leadership and mentoring skills and support a colleague's career journey!

### Cybersecurity alert: Watch out for 'Smishing' text messages

IT recently became aware of smishing attempts targeting our staff. These attacks involved text messages from someone posing as one of the executives at NKC. We have seen reports of them posing as Rebecca Fox (President & CEO), though the attackers could pose as any NKC staff. The intention behind these messages is likely for financial gains and/or to obtain sensitive information.

In the reported cases, the phone number was **727-252-6402**. If you receive a text message that looks like the example below, please ignore and delete the message. Attackers can easily change phone numbers, so please remain vigilant.



### New timeclock feature available

As of today, employees will be able to approve their timecards directly on the timeclock. When you head to the timeclock, you'll find a brand-new button on the second page labeled 'View Timecard.'

This new function will empower you to review your timecard, request time off, check your total pay for the pay period, and approve or remove approval on your timecard—all directly from the timeclock!

To view your timecard, simply click on 'View Timecard.' This will display the current pay period along with your total hours for each day. You'll also be able to click on a pencil icon for a closer look at your daily totals. While this option is designed for review rather than edits, you will be able to approve your timecard or remove approvals as well as request time off.

Additionally, once you click on Request Time Off, you'll be able to create new time off requests, cancel existing requests, and monitor the status of your time off requests. After submitting your request, it will be sent to your manager for review and approval.

- Capital grant requests: Yesler Terrace construction and Pharmacy relocation.
- Certificate of Need: Educating on the importance of equitable healthcare access as we navigate new legislative representation.

In January we began the discovery phase of a new initiative to build our electronic health record (EHR)/billing system digital strategy. From now through June, we will be meeting with key stakeholders to gather information about how the Clarity clinical system and the TIME billing system currently support the work of our teams. We also hope to understand what needs are currently unmet and get a better picture of what our needs will be in the future.

### Black History Month - did you know facts

In honor of Black History Month, learn more about some Black pioneers in health care whose work and impact can still be felt today.

• <u>Dr. Samuel L. Kountz</u> – A pioneering Black transplant surgeon, Dr. Kountz performed over 500 kidney transplants in his career. He developed innovations in organ preservation and rejection prevention, helping make kidney transplants more successful.

- <u>Dr. Velma Scantlebury-White</u>: The first Black female transplant surgeon in the United States, Dr. Scantlebury-White has performed over 2,000 kidney transplants and has been a vocal advocate for increasing organ donation rates in the Black community.
- <u>Dr. Patricia Bath</u>: While best known for her invention of laser cataract surgery, Dr. Bath also researched racial health disparities, including those related to kidney disease, and advocated for equitable healthcare access.
- Dr. Leonidas Berry: A pioneering gastroenterologist, Dr. Berry's research on hypertension in Black communities helped inform understanding of kidney disease risk factors and the importance of early detection.
- <u>Dr. Julianne Malveaux</u>: An economist and public health advocate, Dr. Malveaux has highlighted the economic and racial disparities in kidney disease treatment and organ transplantation, pushing for policy changes.

### **Nutrition and Fitness corner**

Diversity is one of our strongest assets. This month we celebrate Black History Month! As we celebrate history, we can improve our awareness: Kidney disease impacts Black Americans more substantially than many other groups. For example, Black Americans make up about 13% of the United States population, yet 35% of people on dialysis are Black Americans. Nearly 5 million Black Americans over age 20 have diabetes and 40% have high blood pressure – the two leading causes of kidney disease. Inequity in health care and racism contribute to the increase in kidney disease risk. We start to celebrate our diversity when we find the health in ourselves and look for ways to share it. Find someone different and share a healthy snack. Stand Up. Participate. Below are some great healthy sharable foods from our NKC recipes!

### **Almond Pecan Caramel Popcorn**

### Ingredients

### Based on 10 servings per recipe.

- 20 cups popped popcorn (about 3/4 cup popcorn kernels)
- 2 cups unblanched almonds
- 1 cup pecan halves
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup unsalted butter
- 1/2 cup corn syrup
- pinch of cream of tartar

• 1 teaspoon baking soda

### Preparation

- 1. In a large roasting pan, layer cooked popcorn evenly with almonds and pecans.
- 2. In large heavy saucepan, stir together sugar, butter, corn syrup and cream of tartar.
- 3. Bring to boil over medium-high heat, stirring constantly. Let boil for 5 minutes without stirring.
- 4. Remove from heat and stir in baking soda.
- 5. Pour caramel evenly over popcorn mixture, stirring to coat well.
- 6. Bake at 200 degrees for 1 hour, stirring every 10 minutes.
- 7. Let cool, stirring occasionally. Store in airtight tin for up to one week.
